Uncle Sam Unwraps a Parcel Deal

WASHINGTON - (UP) You can put letters in your Christmas packages this year without having to pay first class postage on the whole par-

The Post Office department announced Monday a new "combination" mall service that makes it possible for the first i time in history to include a letter or message inside a fourth-class parcel post package or inside a copy of a publication mailed under second class mall entry.

The new service starts next Monday, Nov. 28 on a 60-day trial basis. All you have to do is indicate on the outside of the package that a letter is onclosed. Then you pay the regular postage rate for the parcel, plus an extra three-cent stamp for the letter.

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield said the new system should spell the end of the familiar phrase, "we are serding under separate cover." Previously he said, post office patrons had "no practical way to send a letter with a gift or with laundry mailed back and forth to school except by paying first-class postage on the entire parcel, or by pasting the envelope on the outside of the package."

If a letter was enclosed in a package without payment of first class postage on the entire parcel, the sender was liable to fines up to \$100.

Memory Still Claims Asks to Remain

For Treatment; Future in Doubt

By RICHARD RUNDELL

Herald Staff Writer Fugitive Russell Tongay surrendered to California police late Monday night, just nine days after he fled from a Florida prison guard who had taken him to New Orleans for medical treatment.

The burly ex-Coast Guardsman told Los Angeles officers that he had hitch-hiked to California while suffering from amnesia. He said he lost his memory as the result of a minor automobile accident in which he was involved while en route from the state prison at Raiford to New Orleans,

His surrender followed a barrage of cross-country telephone calls to a friend in Miami. The friend, William Burrell, Jr., Coral Gables High school swimming coach, last talked to Tongay at 6 p.m. Monday, and said he urged the fugitive to give himself up.

"I didn't escape," Tongay told Los Angeles police who picked him up at Washington hospital accident about two hours before He said he lost his memory

and just now things are beginning to clear up. He said that later that day of the accident he just walked out of a restaurant while the prison guard was payling the bill. Tongay said he didn't realize he was in custody at the

The guard said at the time, however, that Tongay jammed his way into a crowd of persons leaving the restaurant, and ran at full speed down a nearby alley to make good his ex-

Tongay was serving a 10-year manslaughter sentence for the ideath of his aquatot daughter Kathy. He was being taken to New Orleans for treatment of a lung ailment.

What will happen to him now remains in doubt. A Los Angeles attorney who said he is representing Tongay said the former swimming instructor wants to stay in California for further medical

treatment. However, Los Angeles police have received a telegraphic warrant from Florida authorities asking that Tongay be returned to this state.

After Tongay reached California, he said he looked up a minister he had known during World War II while he was in service in that area. He stayed with the minister for a while, he said, but declined to

name the clergyman. Although he reportedly had \$28 on him when he escaped, Tongay said he actually "didn't have a nickel." He said he saw a car with California license plates in New Orleans and that the driver took him as far as El Paso, Tex., paying for his meals on the way. From there he caught a series of


